- Order investigations by Cafcass regarding children's welfare.
- Determine fault and facts about past events.
- Provide emergency solutions and enforce protocols.

Prioritise safety, respect, and children's welfare.

- Support you in choosing the best process for your family.
- Offer sensitive legal guidance and negotiation support.
- Enable transitions between mediation and litigation if needed.

- New Family Proceedings Rules (FPR) from April 2024 mandate considering NCDR at every stage.
- These rules ensure fairness, cost-effectiveness, and resource allocation in court proceedings.
- While courts can't mandate NCDR, they can encourage it and adjourn proceedings for it.
- Combination approaches involving courts and NCDR may suit complex cases best.
- Your choice of process can be revisited as your case progresses.
- In all family matters, courts aim for fair outcomes considering the circumstances.
- Consider mediation or other forms of NCDR for predictable outcomes and involvement in the decision-making process.
- Courts involve Cafcass in children's cases and follow specific steps in finance cases.
- Your choice will depend on the need for directive approaches, cost, and the potential for NCDR options serving you and your ex better.
- <u>Remember</u>: Actively consider all NCDR options before litigation, as per the preapplication protocol and FPR, unless in exceptional circumstances.
